### FATALITY IN THE MARKETS FIELD.

Patrick Whelan, 23, car enter, while working at the Munster-Corinacht Exhibition ground, in the Markets on Tuesday evening, fell off a scaffold a distance of fourteen feet, and sustained terrible injuries to his head, from which he died a few minutes after admission to Barrington's Hospital. Deceased was unmarried.

### THE INQUEST—DECEASED SUBJECT TO FITS.

At noon yesterday, in the Boardroom of Barrington's Hospital, Mr. M. DeCourcey, City Coroner, held an inquest on the body of deceased Mr. Gaffney, who was picked up by Charles Whelan, brother of deceased, said his brother was working within 30 feet of him. When picked up he was alive. Head Constable Walsh—Do you know that he was subject to anything? Yes, he was subject to epileptic fits. How was the scaffolding—was it secure? As far as I could see there was nothing the matter with it to cause him to fall. Answering the Coroner, the witness said the platform on which the men were working was three feet by two feet. Head Constable Walsh said there were seven inches between the planks. The Coroner—A man could not fall between that space. Head Constable Walsh said the height from which deceased fell was exactly 12 feet 2 inches. George Fogarty, assistant in Messrs. Ryan's offices, stated he was after passing by Whelan when the accident occurred. He heard some commotion, and looking round, saw the man falling; his head and side came in contact with the ground. As far as witness could observe, none of the scaffolding gave way. A Juror (Mr. Griffin)—Was there any guard round the platform? No, only the 2-7 by 3 which were laid on the trestles. The witness, replying to the Head Constable, said the total height of the building to the ridge was 20 feet. When the accident happened deceased was engaged nailing a board. James O'Brien, Cathedral Place, stated when he saw the man on the ground he was working his mouth as if he was in a fit. Timothy Dante, who worked on the same platform, said the scaffolding was properly constructed. Mr. Griffin said his opinion was that there should not be a division of seven inches between the planks. The Coroner—The scaffolding was constructed in the ordinary way? Witness—Yes.

Mr. Griffin—I think there is a great want of care shown in the erection of those scaffoldings. For the sake of a couple of extra planks there would be nothing like this. There would be no chance of a man getting killed if ordinary care was taken. I speak on behalf of humanity, and I hope the Coroner will take a note of what I say.

Mr. Ryan was sworn, and deposed to the construction of the scaffolding. It was perfectly secured, and was erected in the same way as for buildings of 40 and 50 feet. No one regretted the accident more than he did, and every precaution was taken to protect the lives of his employes.

The Foreman—Did you know that this man was subject to fits? No. Did any of the other men know it? Except his brother, I believe. If we had known it we would not have allowed him on the scaffolding. Dr. Nunan stated that deceased was admitted about 6.20, and died soon after from concussion of the brain.

Answering the doctor, Charles Whelan said his brother had been subjected to fits since he was about 12 years of age. He generally got them at night, and at intervals of three months.

Mr. Ryan said the deceased had only been in his employ nine days.

Mr. Gaffney said they had the evidence of the brother of deceased on the question, as well as that of experienced men, who if there was anything wrong would take the side of a fellow-employe as against the employer. The juror appeared to have come into the room with pre-conceived ideas on the whole subject.

Mr. Griffin denied the assertion, and said he did not even know the deceased. Until he was asked to serve on the jury by the police sergeant he did not know of the fatality.

The Coroner said when the jury was arriving at a verdict they could add any rider they liked to it.

Thomas H. Brummell, the foreman of the works, illustrated the scaffolding, which he said was erected in accordance with the established method of the building trade.

The jury returned a verdict that death was caused by concussion of the brain consequent on a fall on the 17th inst., and that same was accidental.

### DEATH OF MR. M. H. BREWS, BANK OF IRELAND

We announce with sincere regret the death of Mr. M. H. Brews, senior clerk Bank of Ireland, Clonmel, which occurred on Tuesday evening at the Fever Hospital, after a few days' illness of typhoid. The deceased, who was son of Mr. Michael Studdert Brews, J.P., Ballyerra House, Kilmish, was only 28 years of age. He entered the service of the Bank of Ireland at Clonmel six years ago, and during his residence there he gained the warm regard of many friends and the esteem of the officers and customers of the bank, which he well merited. The sad intelligence of his death was heard in Clonmel, Kilmish, and Limerick, with the deepest regret. The remains were removed from the hospital at 7 a.m. this morning, and were conveyed by the 8 o'clock train to Limerick for interment.
