FUNERAL OF MR. JAMES LESLIE

Yesterday morning the funeral of the late Mr. James Leslie took place for St. Munchin's Cemetery, the family burial place. The deceased, whose death occurred on Sunday, had attained the fine old age of 76 years. The late Mr. Leslie was a retired N.C.O. of many years standing, and since his retirement had resided at Geraldine Place, New street. He served for considerable number of years in the 1st and 2nd West India Regiments as Hospital Sergeant, and later occupied the position of Orderly Room Sergeant on the staff of the Limerick Garrison Artillery. During his period of military service he was held in high esteem by the authorities and his colleagues, and in Limerick, the city of his adoption, his unvarying courtesy and kindness endeared him to a large circle of friends, who were present at the interment to pay him a final tribute of respect. In addition to a large body of civilian mourners, the Garrison Artillery, and the 5th Battalion of Munster Fusiliers were represented by a number of sergeants, who acted as pall bearers.

The chief mourners were—Mr. Charles Leslie (son), Mr. Albert E. Enright (son-in-law), Messrs Charles and Joe Enright (grandchildren), and Mr. Joe Enright and Mr. A. Kearon.
