DEATH OF MR. THOMAS ROBINSON

We regret to record the death of an old and
highly respected citizen, Mr. Thomas Robinson
Pawnbroker, which took place at his residence
8 Nelson street, yesterday in the 80th year of
his age. Mr. Robinson had been but some ten
days ill. Though a familiar personality in the
city, yet all through his long and active life he
was of a very retiring disposition, justly
esteemed for his unswerving rectitude and
his kindly and charitable disposition. Indeed his
work amongst the poor was as unostentatious as
it was generous. He was, perhaps, the oldest
surviving member of the old Bedford Row
Methodist Church congregation, of which he
filled the position of "Leader," and took a keen
interest in the various branches of church work.
He was also one of the oldest members of the
Protestant Young Men's Association, but as
already indicated, he never took part in public
life. The sympathy of a wide circle of friends
is extended to his family in their bereavement.
The funeral is announced to leave at nine
o'clock on Monday morning for the Central Hall,
Bedford Row, where a short service will be held
and the remains then removed to St. Munchin's
for interment at the family burial place.
