BUTTER PACKAGES

Condemned by the Trades Council

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At the meeting of the Limerick Trades and Labour Council held on Friday evening, June 14th, Mr. E. Daly, V.P., in the chair, delegates from the following societies were present-Drapers' assistants, sawyers, printers, coopers, bakers. masons, cabinet makers, plasterers, and carpenters. The secretary stated that the local timber merchants sent samples of butter packages and staves to the Trades Con-gress held in Dublin last month, and that delegates, of whom a number practical coopers, spoke the suitability of the timber and excellent work. manship of the packages. The Chairman of the Dablin Trades Council, Mr. John Lumeden, exhibited some of the packages and staves at a meeting of the Council of the Dublin Industrial Development Association, and stated that the importation of butter packages was reprehensible and caused serious injury to a legitimate Irish industry, whilst Irish manufacturers were capable of producing as good and as cheap a package as the foreigner the Council considered that the matter should be fully considered by those who imported these goods, and the trade given to Irish firms.

THE LAND PURCHASE ACT

In the House of Lords yesterday Lord Denman. replying to a series of questions by the Earl of Donoughmore, stated that the total amount on the 31st May, 1907, of applications for advance in direct sales of estates to tenants under the Irish Land Purchase Act, 1903, was £50,750,549. The total amount lodged in the bank or otherwise advanced in respect of these sales was £17,707,022, of which \$26,107,665 had been allocated or distributed, and £1,312 869 had been transferred to the Land Judges' Court. The amount available for further advances was £1,944,000.

"THE MIKADO."

Mr. Gladstone announced in the House of Commons last evening that the prchibition of the 'Mikado' music and words has been un conditionally withdrawn.
