FUNERAL OF ELIZABETH LADY BARRINGTON.

The funeral of the late Elizabeth Lady
Barrington took place to-day and was in every
way a fitting tribute to a lady who was beloved
by her immediate friends and revered by the poor
of Clonkeen where she lived. At half-past one
the remains arrived at the terminus and were
immediately transferred to the hearse in waiting.
They were followed by a large concourse
to St. Mary's Cathedral where the interment
took place in the family vault on
the south side of the venerable edifice.
In the Cathedral the coffin, which bore a simple
inscription, was deposited, while the service
was being held. The Rev. H. W. Davidson, M.A.,
Abington, read the opening sentence of the
service, after which the choir sang the hymn,
"Nearer my God to Thee." The Dean read the
lesson, and at its conclusion the hymn "Jesus
Lives" was sung. As the coffin was being borne
out of the church the Dead March in Saul was
played on the organ.
