DEATH OF ELIZABETH LADY BARRINGTON.

We announce with very sincere regret which is shared in by all classes and creeds in the city and county, the death of Elizabeth Lady Barrington, which occurred yesterday at the residence of her son-in-law, the Rev. Digby Scott, of Bray. Her ladyship, who was in her 73rd year, had been in failing health for some time past, and latterly was on a visit to Bray where it was hoped change of air would in time bring about convalescence. She was relict of the late Sir William Hartigar Barrington, 1st Baronet, third Baronet, and second daughter of the late Henry Darley, Esq., of Winfield, Co. Wicklow. Her brother is Sir Frederick Darley, Chief Justice of Australia. For more than thirty years Lady Barrington has resided at Clonkeen, Barrington's Bridge, and to say that she was beloved by the poor people of this and the surrounding districts but feebly conveys their feelings of respect and affection for a lady who took an abiding interest in their welfare, and never wearied in the cause of charity, and in every good and useful work. She took a most active interest in connection with the various fetes held from time to time in the city in behalf of Barrington's, St. John's, and other institutions, and usually presided at a stall where she had the hearty sympathy and co-operation of her daughters, Mrs. Digby Scott and Miss Barrington. In the promotion of home industries and cottage gardening Lady Barrington took a leading part, and in connection with the Limerick Branch of the Irish Industries Association of which Miss Barrington is the lady hon. sec., she established the Clonkeen wood-carving class, which has had a most successful career, and one fraught with material benefits to its members. Lady Barrington's zeal and energy found further scope in that excellent cause, the nursing of the poor in their own homes, and she was one of the founders of a branch of the Jubilee Nursing Association in Limerick and District several years ago. In short, her ladyship during her long and active life gave proof of her belief in the truism that "Benevolence to our fellow creatures is the most acceptable gratitude we can evince towards God." Her death will be keenly felt in the district which for such a long span of years she graced by her presence and by her kindly and gentle manner, and the deepest sympathy of all who had the pleasure of knowing her ladyship and, recognising her worth, goes forth to her daughters and the other members of the Barrington family in their keen sorrow. The deceased lady was aunt of Sir Charles Barrington, D.L., Glenstal Castle, fifth Baronet.

The funeral will leave Limerick terminus for interment in the family vault at St. Mary's Cathedral on Tuesday next at 1.15 o'clock on the arrival of the 9.15 a.m. train from Dublin.
