He was promoted from the command of the troops in the Punjab last year, and has since been living chiefly on his Irish estates in county Clare. His military service extends to 47 years. He received a good pension four years ago, and it is understood that a special reward will be bestowed upon him on his retirement.

We regret to record the death of Mr. Robert Lidwill Brown, J.P., Clonboy, Bridgetown, Co. Clare, which took place at his residence, South Ville, Limerick, on Sunday last in his 70th year. The deceased who was connected with several of the oldest families in Limerick and Clare was a magistrate for these Counties, and several years ago was an ex-officio guardian of the Limerick Union. He was an extensive land agent, and in politics a staunch Unionist. In the Protestant Aid Society, of which for very many years he was Hon. Secretary, he took the deepest interest, and was a constant attendant at its meetings while his health permitted. He was a gentleman of practical action and kindly and charitable disposition. His demise is deeply regretted by many friends, the sympathy of whom go forth to his respected family in their bereavement. The funeral is announced to be private.

Dr. George Pierce.

The residents of Newcastle West and surrounding districts have heard with great regret of the death of an old and familiar personality, Dr. George Pierce, which took place at his residence on Sunday afternoon, in his 74th year. He had been in ill-health for some time past. Dr. Pierce had been intimately associated with the daily life of Newcastle West for very many years past. He enjoyed a large professional practice, was a gentleman of a courteous and retiring manner, and won the respect and esteem of all sections of the community. His death creates a vacancy in the medical officership of the workhouse. The funeral takes place on Wednesday, at 12 o'clock, for Churchtown.
