### IMPRESSIVE SPECTACLE.

### WIDESPREAD EVIDENCES OF SYMPATHY.

The remains of the late Right Rev. Thomas Bunbury, D.D., Lord Bishop of Limerick, Ardfer, and Aghadoe, were removed from the Palace, Henry Street, at eleven o'clock this morning for interment in the family vault at St. Mary's Cathedral. The cortege was of immense proportions, all classes and creeds being present from the city, and numerous representatives from the Counties of Limerick, Clare, and Kerry. The business houses on the line of route between the Palace and the Cathedral had their blinds drawn, or shutters up, and business was completely suspended while the cortege was passing. Crowds lined the whole length of the route, and heads were reverently bared as the hearse containing the massive coffin passed along the streets. On all sides the fullest evidence of respect for the memory of the Bishop, who was so closely identified with the County and City of Limerick for close on 45 years, was expressed, as well as deep sympathy with Mrs. Bunbury and her family in their great sorrow. It may here be stated that his lordship's two sons are in India—Lieut.-Colonel W. E. Bunbury, commanding the 14th Sikhs at Ferozepore; and Lieut.-Colonel Vesey Bunbury, commanding the 2nd Batn.
