THE "BERLIN" DISASTER.

The bodies of the victims of the disaster, including the remains of the jockey, were landed from the helmsford at Harwich this morning. They were each covered with the Union Jack, upon them were placed wreaths from the Eastern Company's agent at Hook. The jockey's remains were sent by early train to London for funeral, and the other bodies were those of four members of the crew, who were referred to a temporary mortuary for removal to their homes.

The Survivors.

Survivor's Story

Fisher, the only surviving member of the crew, also arrived at Leamington. He has not yet recovered from the effects of the terrible exposure. His feet and legs being numb. To the Helmsford crew he said that, soon after the Berlin struck, the deck house came down with a crash, and it maimed many women sheltering under the skylight of the engine-room. He saw by one they were washed away. He went to his rescue to his father. He said he was rescued by means of the smoke-ropes. Seeing a rope thrown by the Dutchman he fastened it to the rail. He went to the rope, propelling himself along by means of his shoulders and arms, his legs were paralysed by the cold.
