The Archbishop of Dublin presiding, a resolution was adopted expressing the hope that sustained exertions would be made in every diocese and parish to ensure at the whole of the sum for which the appeal had been made, £250,000, be collected within the next two years.

## CONVERTS TO PROTESTANTISM.

The Berlin correspondent of the "Chronicle" states that according to a statement published by the ecclesiastical authorities, 4364 persons in Austria joined the Lutheran Church last year. Since the beginning of "Los von Rom" (Away from Rome) movement in 1858, the total number of Protestant converts from Roman Catholicism in Austria is officially stated to be 42,395.
