ALLEGED INJURY TO A WEIR.

In the Admiralty Court, Mr. Justice Johnson, with Captain Alexander as Nautical Assessor, dismissed an action brought by Wm. Loherty, fisherman, of Checkpoint, near Waterford, to recover £80 damages from the Limerick Steamship Company, Limited, for injuries alleged to have been sustained by his weir at Shelbourne Bay, Waterford Harbour, through the negligence of the defendants' servants in navigating the defendants' vessel "Sinaian" on the 5th of December last, while proceeding up the Suir. The defence was that the vessel was obliged to run for shelter in the River Suir and anchor in the vicinity of the weir; and further, that the damage was the result of inevitable accident.
