## SUFFRAGETTES.

### d on the House of Commons.

a determined raid was made on the Commons by several hundred suffragettes. A largely attended meeting of women in the afternoon a deputation was appointed to the House of Commons, and demanding the Premier's suffrage for women. The whole meeting marched towards the House but before reaching it they were surrounded by mounted police and scattered. In an attempt they tried to break the cordon at the Queen's entrance, and flung themselves violently against the police. The attacks were of a violent kind, and both sides showed their temper with the result that the women were roughly handled, and in a few dozen of them were in custody. Another party of women tried to break through the cordon at the Palace Yard entrance, but efforts being defeated they became angry, and attacked the police, and a struggle ensued. The attack was continued for three hours, and 59 arrests were made of the women resisting violently.
