PILOT'S SAD DEATH.

Drowned in the Shannon.

An inquest has been held by Mr. Thomas Lillis, J.F., Coroner for West Clare, on the body of a pilot named McNamara, aged about 60, who was drowned off the pilot boat near Beale Bar last month, after putting another pilot on beard a French ship bound for Limerick. The remains were washed up at Rhinvella Bay.

Pilos Griffin gave evidence touching the occurrence. He and McNamara after putting a pilot on board the "Frenchman," were returning, when decaased accidentally went overboard. The right was dark, and although "beaving to" and hanging around for some time, he could not see M'Namara again.

A verdict of accidental deowning was returned.
