SENSATIONAL JEWEL ROBBERY

On Saturday evening Sergeant Lonergan, William street, effected one of the most important arrests that has taken place in the city for some time. The accused, who stands charged with the larceny of large quantities of jewellery is a railway porter named John Sheridan, of Waterford, and the victim of the robbery is a lady whose husband holds a responsible position in the adjoining county of Clare. On the 10th of last month she was travelling by rail from Waterford to Limerick, when she left a bag containing about £50 worth of jewellery in official custody at both places. She was returned the bag at the terminus in the usual way, but when she arrived home an examination of it revealed that all the property had been abstracted. Word was at once sent to the police, who up to this have been instituting close enquiries, and even now display considerable reticence in connexion with the affair. The accused man has been remanded in custody on the charge preferred for eight days.

NOVEL CASE AT KILRUSH.

At Kilrush Petty Sessions Court yesterday, before Messrs. A. M. Harper, R.M., B. Culligan, M. Mesal, J. R. Kett, and M. O'Doherty, District Inspector McNally prosecuted a farmer named Matthew Mulqueen and his wife for failing to appear at the last Quarter Sessions at Kilrush in the case of Thomas Mulqueen who had appealed against the magistrates decision ordering him thirty-one days imprisonment for assaults on the people named, who stood in relationship of uncle and aunt to him.

Mr. Kelly, solicitor, who represented the defendants, said this was the most novel case that had ever come within his experience. His clients were at the time determined to go on in the matter, but on the intervention of the Parish Priest, and in deference to his wishes, they settled out of Court. It was not a Crown prosecution at all, and if the police wished old Mulqueen could have been brought forward at the Sessions as he was in town on the appeal day.

The Court held that as the County Court Judge, the late Mr. Myles Kehoe, was satisfied at the non-attendance of the appellants they were not obliged to review his decision and dismissed the case, at the same time announcing that in their opinion Mr. McNally acted properly in bringing forward the case for investigation.
