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TO-DAY'S TELEGRAMS.

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PREMIER TAKEN SUDDENLY ILL.

The Press Association's Bristol correspondent telegraphs:—Sir Henry Campbell Bannerman, after addressing the great meeting at Colston Hall last night, was seized with a sudden illness. He was the guest of Mr. Howell Davies, M.P., and the house was aroused shortly after midnight by news of the Premier's indisposition. Medical men were summoned and remained with the Premier over an hour. The sharpness of the attack then passed, and the Premier afterwards slept quietly.

The "Bristol Times and Mirror" understands that when the doctors arrived it was found necessary to administer oxygen. The doctors remained with the Premier over an hour, leaving him at three o'clock when he had sunk into a slumber.

Engagements Cancelled.

To-day he was to have inspected the new docks at Avonmouth, but it is feared all engagements for the next few days may have to be cancelled.

Heart Trouble the Cause

A Bristol telegram states that it is understood the Premier's illness is caused by some heart trouble, and medical men have forbidden him to leave his bed to-day. By Sir Henry's special desire to-day's programme will be carried out by Mr. Birrell on behalf of the Government. The Premier's medical advisers have been summoned from London. This is not the first attack of the same kind from which Sir Henry has suffered, and much sympathy is expressed with him.

Official Bulletin

An official bulletin issued at 10 Downing street this morning states that Sir Henry Campbell Bannerman was extremely fatigued with his efforts of yesterday. In consequence of this he has had very little sleep, and it will not be prudent for him to leave his bed to-day, and Mr. Birrell takes the Premier's place at to-day's functions.
