INTERNATIONAL MATCH.

IRELAND V. SCOTLAND.

(BY TELEGRAPH FROM OUR OWN REPORTER.)

At Inverleith this afternoon the representatives of Ireland and Scotland met in their thirtieth encounter in very fine weather. From an early hour thousands of people made their way to the grounds, and when the match commenced there were about 20,000 spectators present. With regard to the Irish team there was a big improvement upon that which defeated England at Lansdowne Road a few weeks ago, Allen and Gardiner, strengthening the Irish pack. The Scotch team was the same as that which defeated Wales a week ago, except that the crack half, Munro, now came on at half. Allen captained the Irish team, and Munro the Scotchmen, who on entering the field of play were received with great enthusiasm.
