## ALLEGED LARCENY OF TEA AT THE RAILWAY.

### THREE ARRESTS.

A vandriner named James Broden, in the employment of Stewart's Biscuit Factory, Bedford Row, was arrested by Sergeant Smith to-day, on the charge of having been concerned in the carrying away of tea from the railway premises without authority, and Augustus O'Brien, of the labouring class, said to be in the employment of the Railway Company, was arrested by Sergeant Lonergan on the charge of the larceny of the tea. It is alleged that one of the chests of tea which was missing from the railway premises, was traced to the house of Timothy Frawley, and he too was arrested on the charge of receiving the tea, knowing it to have been stolen. The three prisoners were brought before the adjourned Court of Petty Sessions to-day, and remanded to next Sessions, Mr. Hickson intimating that he would accept bail for their appearance.

It was stated in evidence by a railway employe that about four chests of tea had been missing within the past few months.

## JESUIT COLLEGE DESTROYED.

### HUGE FIRE IN BOULOGNE.

A Reuter's Boulogne Sur Mer telegram to-day says:—A big fire broke out last night at the Jesuit College, situated on the Calais road, near the Napoleon Column, an hour after the pupils retired to rest. The entire four-storey building, covering a large area, was gutted, and is now a heap of smouldering ruins. The loss is estimated at forty thousand pounds.

### S.P.C.A.
