FLUNG UNDER A TRAM.

Sad End of a Young Life.

While driving up Grafton street, Dublin, yesterday, Mr. Charles Walsh, a young Dublin gentleman, who had only been sworn in as a Solicitor of the High Court a few weeks ago, was flung from an outside car into the roadway. He was stunned by the fall and before assistance could be given an incoming tram passed over the prostrate body, crushing the chest so terribly that death ensued almost immediately.

DEATH OF MR. J. A. MacAULEY.

We regret to record the death, which took place yesterday at the residence of his brother, Rosbrien House, of Mr. J. A. MacAuley, a well known and talented journalist. The earlier portion of his career was spent in Derry and Enniskillen, and later on in England and Scotland. Some eight years ago he became Editor of the "Munster News," and after some time he went to Cork and Kerry. Deceased, who was well into middle life, had been in delicate health for some time past, and his demise was not unexpected, and during the past year he had been assiduously attended to by his brother, to whom he was devotedly attached, and with whom the utmost sympathy is expressed in the bereavement he has sustained. The funeral will take place from Rosbrien House to-morrow at 3 p.m.

"AMENDING" TENDERS.

(FROM OUR CORRESPONDENT.)

At the meeting of the Kilrush Board of Guardians on Saturday, the Clerk read a letter from the Local Government Board stating that appeared on the 28th ult. the Guardians accepted the tender for £10 for printing for the year, while another tendered at £3 17s 6d, and requested the Guardians' explanations for doing so, and also requesting the Clerk to state whether he had recorded the Guardians' names who had voted on the resolution.

In marking the letter "read" the Guardian stated the representative of the "Clare Champion Company had given a written undertaking that the Company would pay the difference if a surcharge was made, and that the Board wished to keep the money in the County.

Referring to the matter the "Irish Printer to-day says:—We can hardly conceive of anything more irregular than the practice referred to by the "Limerick Chronicle." Whilst we are not in any way object to a firm seeking permission to amend a tender when an error has been made, yet we do think there is a lack of honourable dealing between man and man. We say nothing of the illegality of the proceeding when, after the tenders have been read out, a favoured or favourite house is allowed to alter its price to a lower figure, and thus secure the contract. Had we been writing on this subject we should hardly have used the word "amended."
