"Daniel McCarthy objected to the "stage Irishman" at a Liverpool theatre by peremptorily demanding that the play should be stopped. He was given into custody by the manager and detained for an hour and a half. He brought an action at Liverpool yesterday for £50 damages, but the jury stopped the case and gave a verdict for the defendants.

Cardinal Steinhuber died at Rome at five o'clock on Tuesday.

The death is announced of Mr. William M. Farlane, the proprietor of "Sporting Life," at the age of 73.

Messrs. Mackley Brothers, of Norwich, have just exported to New York the season's first consignment of canaries, consisting of 2,000 birds. The canaries have been collected chiefly from working men.

An official report to the Canadian Railway Commission announces there is an abundant winter supply of coal in the North-West. Last year there was a serious fuel famine.

Sparks from the kitchen fire ignited a chair in which the two year old daughter of Mrs. Cooper was left sitting, at 82 Wynford Road, Islington, and the child was burnt to death before the brigade arrived.

The trustee savings banks of the United Kingdom, numbering 224, had 1,759,228 accounts on November 20 of last year (according to a Blue Book issued yesterday), and the sum due to depositors was £53,009,098. The assets against this amount were £54,343,878.

Speaking at the corner stone laying of a new church the Bishop of Bristol said the world seemed to be trying to get on in many parts without religion, and was making a mess of it.

The work of enlarging the second gallery of the Simplon Tunnel for regular railway traffic is to be begun almost immediately. It will cost £1,385,000, and will take seven years to complete.

It is generally admitted that Berlin is the best governed city in Europe. The capital of the German Empire is in the happy position of having this year a surplus of about £700,000. Of this sum, £450,000 is to be devoted to the construction of new waterworks.

The Bishop of London had what was probably the most novel experience in his career on Tuesday, says the New York correspondent of the London "Daily Express," when he preached from a soap box in Wall street to a crowd composed largely of millionaire bankers and stockbrokers.
