FRANCHISE CLAIMANTS.

A Big Increase.

The revision of the City Voters' and Jurors' Lists will take place in the County Courthouse during the last week in September. The total number of voters on the list is 6,943 occupiers and householders, 75 freeholders and leaseholders, and 19 freemen. In the impending revision his Honor Judge Adams will, in addition, have to scrutinize the claims of 459 additional occupiers and householders, 105 old lodgers, 64 new lodgers, and of 2 freeholders. The Town Clerk to-day published the list of objections, which comprise, in all, 16. Comparing the state of the register with last year, there is an increase of 1,287 claimants to the franchise this year. In order to establish their claims, it is incumbent on all applicants to attend at the Revision Sessions.

CITY BATHING FATALITY.

A Youth Drowned.

A sad drowning fatality occurred in the Ballinacurra river last evening at a place called the New-Found-Out. About half-past seven a youth named Bernard Mitchell, Mount Pleasant Avenue, went to bathe in the stream at fall of tide. He was accompanied by two other boys, and had not been long in the water when he began to show signs of distress, due, no doubt, to the fact of his being unable to swim. His companions got alarmed, and rendered all the assistance in their power, but were unable to take him ashore before he sank in about eight feet of water, and never rose again. The melancholy intelligence was shortly afterwards conveyed to the police, and at half-past ten the body was recovered at a short distance from where he disappeared three hours previously. The deceased was a promising youth, and had just served twelve months of his apprenticeship to the printing trade at the "Munster News." This is the second drowning fatality that has taken place at the New-Found-Out within the past year.

There will be no inquest held.

TRALEE & FENIT RAILWAY COMPANY

Presiding in London yesterday at the half-yearly meeting of the Tralee and Fenit Railway Company, Mr. Hector F. Munro, in moving the adoption of the report, which was carried with unanimity, said that in comparison with the corresponding half year there had been an increase in the traffic receipts of £141 12s. 3d. This amount would doubtless have been larger but for the bad weather, which was responsible for a slight decrease in the passenger traffic. The goods traffic, which was the principal item of traffic on the line, increased by 654 tons and £33 4s. 3d. in money, and the minerals by 2,069 tons, and £132 15s. 10d. in receipts. Under the satisfactory working of the Great Southern and Western Railway Company a continuance of this growth in the traffic of the line might be expected.
