FUNERAL OF DOCTOR NOLAN.

To-day the remains of the late Dr. John Nolan who filled the position of Resident Medical Officer of the Workhouse for over twenty years were laid to rest in the family vault at Ballysimon. On Tuesday night the corpse arrived in the city from Dublin, where death took place, and was taken to St. Munchin's Parochial Church where it rested since. This morning at 10 o'clock a Requiem Mass was celebrated for the deceased gentleman in presence of a large congregation of mourners, and immediately after the massive coffin was taken out to the hearse in waiting. The cortege, large and representative, then fell into line, the route being across Thomond Bridge, through the old town, Patrick Street and William Street.

At the Corporation Committees last night, an application from Messrs. Bannatyne and Son, Messrs. Russell and Sons, and Messrs. Spaight and Sons to have a six-inch water pipe laid from Ceel-street on to the Ashbourne-road was under consideration, and was referred to a committee

PREFERENTIAL TARIFFS.

The President moved a resolution of protest against the action of the Irish Railway Commissioners in giving preferential tariffs to imported goods to the detriment of the home article.

The High Sheriff seconded, and in the course of his observations pointed out instances that the excessive freights on Irish manufactured goods was enough to hamper any industry.
