RAILWAY CRISIS ENDS.

King's Intervention.

London, Wednesday Night.

Mr. R. Bell, M.P., to-night, at a dinner of the Sphinx Club in London, said he had just come from the Board of Trade, where the question in dispute had been settled in a way which he hoped would be satisfactory to all concerned. He could not say anything about the terms of settlement at that juncture beyond the fact that there had been a settlement, and the signatures had been attached to it. The King had interested himself in the matter, and the result had to be communicated to his Majesty before any statement was made.

Late to-night it was announced at the Board of Trade by Mr. Kearley on behalf of the President that Mr. Lloyd George had held conferences today with reference to the questions at issue. Afterwards Mr. Lloyd submitted a proposed agreement.

Further conferences subsequently took place between Mr. Lloyd George and the committees representing the companies and the Amalgamated Society respectively. The result was an agreement was come to by both sides.

Thereafter on behalf of the Society of Locomotive Enginemen and Firemen adherence to the scheme as was signed by Mr. Thomas Lowther, Secretary of the Railway Workers' Union.

The Settlement.

The settlement is in the nature of an agreement signed by representatives of the directors, the Amalgamated Society, the Associated Society, and the General Railway Workers' Union, declaring they are prepared to adopt a system of conciliation and arbitration for the settlement of questions relating to the rates of wages and the hours of labour. Boards are to be formed for each company adhering to the scheme, and the various grades of employes are to be grouped in sections. The latter will choose representatives for each section. Where a Sectional Board fails to arrive at a settlement, the question will be referred to the Central Conciliation Board, and, failing agreement then, arbitration will be resorted to.

Duration of Scheme.

The present scheme to be in force until 12 months after notice has been given by one side to the other to terminate it. No such notice to be given within six years of the present date.
