COUNTY TECHNICAL COMMITTEE.

Science Laboratory at Hospital.

Mr. E. D. Lynch, Intermediate teacher, Hospital, appeared before the County Limerick Committee of Technical Instruction yesterday (Father Casey, P.P., Abbeyfeale, Chairman, presiding), to request that a sum of £80 allocated by the Committee to assist in the equipment of a science laboratory at the Christian Brothers' Schools in that town should not be so applied, as it was the existing Intermediate School conducted by him that was justly entitled to the grant. He said if the Christian Brothers were to qualify for recognition as a secondary school it meant the complete extinction of his school, and the taking away from him of his means of living. His right to teach for the Intermediate was merely permissive, and in the hope that he would be able to provide a science laboratory at his school. He wished to say that he exonerated the Committee of an idea of injuring him, and that he believed they acted without knowledge of the consequences to him and his family. Mr. Coleman assured Mr. Lynch that was so. Mr. Mitchell said the people of Hospital were very anxious to get such a school, but he was apprehensive that Mr. Lynch would not be able to secure a suitable place in the town. Mr. Turnbull, he understood, recently visited Hospital and expressed himself satisfied with the provisions made at the Christian Brothers' Schools. For his (Mr. Mitchell's) part he had no choice, but he would like to see this branch of education taught in Hospital.

Rev. Brother Michael, Hospital, said the grant had been made to their schools by the County Committee on the 26th of March. Two meetings had intervened since and there was no objection made. On the 29th April he sent to the Department a query sheet filled in containing the names and qualifications of those who are to teach in the proposed laboratory, and the entire arrangement had been sanctioned by them.

Lord Monteagle—The secretary says the grant of £80 has not yet been sanctioned by the Department.

Brother Michael—That may not have been sanctioned, but the laboratory and teachers have been approved of. For the last three years Mr. Lynch has got no more than two boys from the Christian Brothers' Schools, and it is for our own schools we are starting the business.

Lord Monteagle—How many boys would you have?

Brother Michael—About 20 more or less.

Mr. Lynch commented upon the undesirability of having more than one intermediate school in a small village like Hospital.

Brother Michael replied that there was nothing in the rules to prevent more than one intermediate school in any centre. Very Rev. Canon Scully and the local committee had a meeting on Sunday, and they arrived at the conclusion that Mr. Lynch could not get a suitable place at all.

Mr. Lynch said he would request the committee to allow him twelve months to provide the science laboratory.

Mr. Coleman—If you would say six months, perhaps matters might be got over.

Mr. Lynch expressed a doubt as to his ability to have preparations made within that time.
