(King's Bench Division-Mr. Justice Boyd.)

In the case of Wm. Scales v. Honoria Carthy, Mr. Comyn (instructed by Messrs. Molony and Pilkington) applied on behalf of the plaintiff for a conditional order for certification bring up an order on appeal made at Ennis by Mr. Justice Gibson for the sum of £30 without costs.
