

man at an election of Conservators the most important one of the whole lot. Objections were disallowed there was no appeal. The section seemed to him too small. Section 17 was a good one as it provided if there was not opposition they need hold an election, but it appeared to him that election under this Bill would cost such an enormous amount of money that if they had election they would have no funds that year for anything else. The Bill did not touch the fisheries question, it was an electioneering Bill, they ought by every means in their power to reject it, and ask the Department to assist them in legislation. If legislation were brought in, it should be for the purpose of improving the fisheries.

Mackey said there might be something of a chance that might be won by elections, but their object at the present time was a Bill which would enable them to preserve the spawning salmon in the river. It was a pity this Bill did not concern the advancement of the fisheries.

After further discussion, Mr. Blood Smyth proposed that the board have carefully considered the Bill, considers it should be opposed by every means, and calling on the Department to assist the board to that effect. The board would send the reasons why they considered the Bill should be opposed.

Mr. Mackey suggested that they could add to the Bill be substituted by one that would be more use to that important district. Mr. Blood Smyth thought they should confine themselves to stating why they did not want this Bill.

Mr. Bayley seconded the resolution, which was adopted unanimously.

The Derby to be Shown.

The last three nights of the wonderful chronomegophone, which has been delighting and arousing large audiences at the Theatre Royal, are announced. From both a scientific and entertainment point of view, an exhibition of this should not be missed by any.
