## CO. CLARE AGRICULTURAL SHOW.

### Great Success.

(FROM OUR CORRESPONDENT.)

The heavy downpour of Thursday night and the threatening appearance of the early morning, did not prepare us for the ideal day which favoured the third annual Show of the County Clare Agricultural Society, which founded on the initiative of the Most Rev. Dr. Fogarty, has achieved such a signal success. The Show was held as usual on the new Show Grounds at Cabircalla, just outside Ennis, and those who had not seen the place since last year were much impressed by the extensive improvements which have been wrought. The Show ring has been considerably extended, and is now, as one of the Judges remarked, one of the finest Show Grounds in Ireland, outside Dublin; and as the Clare Show has come to stay, the Executive will from time to time, as opportunity offers, and occasion requires, carry out still further improvements.

There was an immense attendance, and when the jumping competitions were reached in the afternoon, the grounds were thronged on all sides, and presented a gay and brilliant appearance in the bright sunshine. The entries were a shade in number under those of last year, but there was a distinct improvement in the quality all round, and it is evident that the farmers of Clare are profiting by the efforts and teachings of the Society, and of the County Clare Agricultural Committee, with which it works in harmony. In the stallion class, H. R. H., which has caught the judges notice in Limerick, Galway, and other places, had to yield the red rosette to his stable companion, the bay, Sudd, and the son of Suspender is certainly a fine type of sire. There was a useful lot in the halfbred class, and the grey Klondyke repeated his success of last year. The hunters were up to a very fair standard, and in the two year old class Mr. Ed. Murphy won first place with a nice chestnut son of Turk's Cap, dam by Endurance, which should turn out more than useful. In the bulls there were some very fine animals, and in the shorthorn class, Captain Molony won first place with a splendid beast, for which two hundred guineas have been refused.

The jumping competitions were followed with the closest interest, notably the inter-county challenge contest between Clare and Limerick, which was won by the former by three points. The poultry, butter, and vegetable section was much larger than last year and the exhibits were of an excellent quality. This year there was a salt firkin butter competition, this being a leading industry in Clare. It was promoted by the Butter Buyer's Association, and Mr. P. E. Moloney, Co. C., Ennis, presented a handsome
