DEATH OF MR. R. J. PIGGOTT, J.P.

We regret to announce the death of Mr. Rebert J. Pigott, J.P., which occurred at his residence, Miltown, Oroagh, on Wednesday night. The deceased gentleman had been Chairman of Rathkeale Board of Guardians for a number of years prior to the passing of the Local Government Act and later on Chairman of the District Council, positions which he filled with impartiality and prudence. He was also a member of the County Council and Asylum Committee, where his kindly manner and toleration in all matters won for him the respect of his colleagues and the public generally.
