DEATH OF FATHER RONAN, S.J.

We regret to announce the death which occurred on Tuesday evening at Mungret College of a distinguished ecclesiastic, the Rev. J. Ronan, S.J., in his 83rd year, the 60th of his priesthood, and the 50th of the religious order of which he was a member. Father Ronan was born in the July of 1825, in Down, was educated in Maynooth, and joined the Jesuits in 1850. He was one of the chaplains with the British forces in the Crimea, and for more than a year worked in the hospitals at Scutari and other military stations, and on his return to Ireland became in succession Superior of the Jesuit Missions in Galway and Limerick, and in 1880, when Mungret Model Farm came into possession of the Jesuits he converted the buildings into a college for lay and ecclesiastical students. He travelled to America, and some twenty years ago was appointed head of the Order at Gardiner Street, Dublin. In '97 he ceased from active work and some 6 years ago he returned to Mungret College, where the closing years of an unostentatious but zealous and active life were passed amidst congenial surroundings. The rev. gentleman's demise was unexpected, having been due to apoplexy.
