RAMMED AND SUNK

New Orleans, Thursday—The American fruit steamer *Hugoma* was rammed and sunk in the Mississippi, off New Orleans, last evening by the French cruiser *Klebeg*, during heavy weather. Seven Japanese coal trimmers were drowned.
