**THE LATEST BECK CASE.**  
**IS SHE BELIEVABLE.**  
(BY TELEGRAPH TO-DAY).  
Millie Marsh, a servant girl, was brought up on remand at Westminster to-day, charged on her own confession with perjury during the trial of a man named Lewis, accused of the cheque frauds, and now undergoing imprisonment for the offence. The Public Prosecutor and Mr. Hall Gair were present. Mr. Charles Mathew, who prosecuted, said the fact was that Marsh was not to be believed at all. She had made three statements. The third, given yesterday, was a most material admission, one of such importance that it was questionable whether the case should be proceeded with at all. She yesterday said to the Master of the Police Court, "I met Lewis and Brady together on the Saturday night the cheque was cashed," while in previous statements she said Brady had promised her marriage, and she had falsely accused Lewis. The case was adjourned.
