IMPORTANT FISHERY PROSECUTIONS.

At the suit of the Limerick Fishery Board two important fishery prosecutions took place. At Ballymahon Petty Sessions two men named Jenkins and Devlin were prosecuted for using eel nets upon the Tinalack Weir, County Longford, they not being duly licensed to fish at the time. The defendants were convicted, and fined £6 and costs; and at Rathowen Petty Sessions Bridget Rowe, of Behabane, was prosecuted on the 3rd inst., for placing an eel net in King's Gap of her fishing weir. IRISH EMIGRATION IN 1907

The returns from the Registrar-General office on Irish emigration show a net increase of 3,738 persons over the figures for 1906. Of a total of 39,082 persons who left Ireland in 1907, Munster contributed 5,711, Leinster 14,513 and Connaught 7,570. The figures for 1906, while the increases in the case of the other provinces read:—Leinster, 63; Munster, 1,234; Ulster, 2,183. A total of 9,539 persons had their passages paid in America.
