DEATH OF MR. PATRICK SHEEDY.

The staffs of the CHRONICLE, literary, com posing and commercial, have heard with very sincere regret of the death of a member of their body, Mr. Patrick Sheedy, compositor who passed away at his residence, the Strand, on Sunday night. Mr. Sheedy belonged to a family who have been very largely identified with the printing trade in Limerick and elsewhere. He himself commenced his apprenticeship in the "Chronicle" (where his father spent something like forty years at the case, before being pensioned off a year or two ago), about the year 1886, and proved himself a very able and intelligent craftsman, while his genial manner, good nature, and a desire to please, made him most popular with his fellow workers in this office, and, indeed, with all who had the pleasure of knowing him. Two years ago or more he had to retire from active work owing to failing health. His death was not unexpected, but passing away in the prime of life, his loss is deeply mourned. We sympathise with his widow and family in their sorrow. The funeral took place this afternoon from St. Munchin's R.C. to Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery, and was very largely attended. There was a full representation of the typographical staff (as well as the literary and commercial departments) of the "Chronicle," and other news papers in the city, as well as the printing trade generally. Besides these was a large attendance of the residents of Thomondgate where the deceased was so well and popularly known and highly esteemed. The coffin was strewn with handsome wreaths sent by his fellow workers and other friends. The chief mourners were—The widow of deceased and other relatives. The clergy present were—Fathers Negley and Casey, O.O., St. Munchin's.
