The death of Mr. G. O'Leary Hannigan, late Manager of the National Bank, Dublin, which took place at the Private Hospital, Baggot street, Dublin, brought feelings of poignant sorrow to his immediate relatives, and a large circle of friends, who sincerely mourn his loss. He was a most kindly gentleman, and popular with all classes. His health failing he retired some time ago, and it was his intention to spend Christmas with his parents in the County Limerick, but his doctors would not allow him to travel. The end came with the most perfect peace and calm resignation. Mr. Hannigan belonged to one of the oldest and most highly esteemed families in county Limerick, whose connections extend also far into the county Cork, all commanding popular esteem and regard. The remains were met at Charleville by a large concourse of relatives and friends.
