He says: "I had no idea that I could do Irish hams and pieces of bacon as being a new departure for me. I calculated how many of each I would require, and consequently I did not order one. I cabled order after order. Owing to some delay on the part of the firm they did not come quick enough. They have now arrived; several more are on their way. I have made up my mind to have a shipment every week to keep a full stock in future."
