LAND COMMISSION.

The Chief Land Commission will sit at Limerick on Monday next for the hearing of appeals from Sub Commission and Civil Bill Courts from the county of Limerick and parts of the counties of Clare and Tipperary. SAD BURNING FATALITY

A sad burning accident, which was attended with fatal results, occurred in the city on Sunday evening about 5 o'clock. It appears that a little boy, Francis Deloherty, aged 3 years, living in Back Clare street, was left in charge of an older child by his mother while she was going for some milk. The second child was absent from the room for a short time and meanwhile Francis went to light some papers at the fire and his clothes were soon enveloped in flames. A man named Michael Weldon, a porter employed in Mr. Wm. Lloyd's establishment, made a very plucky attempt to save the little one. He rushed up the stairs, tore off the burning clothes, and wrapping the child up in a quilt, rushed off with him to Barrington's Hospital, where he was attended to by the Resident Surgeon. The child, however, succumbed to his injuries a few hours afterwards. The facts were reported to the Coroner, who did not deem an inquest necessary. Mr. Weldon sustained severe injuries to his hands, and his clothes were badly burned, and he is certainly entitled to every credit for his heroic conduct.

CHILD VICTIMS

A child named Gerald Tyrrell, whose parents live in Crosbie Row, was detained in Barrington's Hospital last evening, where he was brought for treatment for extensive burns. The condition of the child when admitted was serious, but an improvement is noticeable to-day.
