FUNERAL OF MR. JAS. NEVILLE, G.S.W.R.

Imposing Demonstration of Respect.

The funeral of the late Mr. James Neville, Superintendent for the Cork District of the Great Southern and Western Railway Company, whose very sad and unexpected demise at Ennis we recorded in our last issue, took place yesterday for the family burial place at Kilnasoolagh, near Newmarket-on-Fergus, his native place. As in Limerick, so also in Clare, the premature demise of Mr. Neville has evoked feelings of the deepest sorrow, and universal sympathy for his bereaved widow and family. On all sides his popularity, his unvarying courtesy, and geniality of manner, and his great ability in the important official position he had occupied in this district for seven years were borne testimony to by the public in an unmistakable manner; and no better proof of their esteem for the deceased gentleman could be pointed to than the popular demonstration of respect and sympathy which the premature ending of an active and successful career had called forth. In railway circles—not alone in Limerick, where Mr. Neville's death has occasioned the deepest sorrow amongst all grades of the company's officials and servants, but throughout the district, as well as at Kingsbridge and elsewhere, the sad occasion was very deeply felt, and the gathering of railway men themselves at the funeral was very large and representative. Generally speaking, the cortege was of immense proportions, and as a further mark of respect the business establishments in Ennis, and numerous private houses as well, had their blinds drawn. So it was at the stationhouses along the line, and at Newmarket-on-Fergus as well.

The coffin, which was strown with and surrounded by beautiful wreaths of natural flowers, rested in the parish church, in Bindon street, where portion of the funeral service was held about 11.30, the officiating clergymen being the Rector, the Rev. T. H. Abraham, the Rev. Mr. Lougheed, curate, being also present. The church was crowded with mourners. The choir sang the beautiful hymns "Lead, kindly light," and "The King of Love my Shepherd is," and chanted the 90th psalm. At the close, as at the opening of the service, a funeral march was played by Mr. Carter, organist.

The coffin was borne from the church by Limerick and Ennis Railway officials, and carried a considerable distance before being placed in the hearse, which proceeded by road to Kilnasoolagh, some seven or eight miles distant. The cortege was about a mile in length, there being a very large number of vehicles.

The chief mourners were—Mrs. Neville (mother); Mrs. Neville (widow); Miss Neville (daughter); Miss Neville (sister of the deceased); George Young Worthington, Alex. B. Worthington, and W. S. Henchie (brothers-in-law); Joseph Worthington (nephew); John, Thomas, William, and Michael Knight (Castleconnell); Rev. Thomas Dowling, Dr. John Dowling (Gort), and Richard Dowling, C.E.
