DEATH OF DR NASH

The 'Wabigoon Star' (Canada) of January 2nd, 1908, has the following—On Sunday evening last, shortly after eight o'clock, Dr. Nash of Gold Rock, breathed his last, after an illness of several weeks. Never very robust, the doctor had contracted pneumonia, which latterly developed into an acute form, and although Dr. Naismyth was unremitting in his attentions to his suffering colleagues, his enfeebled condition refused to respond, and he expired as above at the residence of Mr. E. B. Martin. Dr. Nash was a native of Ireland, being a graduate of Dublin University, in which city he practised his profession for a few years before coming to Canada. Two years ago he succeeded Dr. McDonald at Gold Rock. Dr. Nash, whose father and other relatives reside at Dublin, was only 31 years of age.

The Dr. Nash above referred to was the son of Mr. C. A. Nash, now the Mexican Consul for Dublin, formerly of Limerick. He was the grandson of the late James Nash, Clerk in Chamber of Commerce, of Sexton street, and great grandson of the late Cornelius Nash, who held a prominent position in the mercantile life of Limerick, from 1808 to 1871, and who may still be remembered among the older generation of our readers.
