Bishops' Opinion.

In his Lenten Pastoral, the Most Rev. Dr. Hoare, Roman Catholic Bishop of Ardagh, condemns cattle driving and boycotting as impious and illicitous.

Most Rev. Dr. O'Dea, Roman Catholic Bishop of Clonfert, says that the driving of cattle off land which a man has a right from a valid contract to grass, and for the purpose of compelling him to give up the land is grievously unjust; "for it is a serious breach of a man's right to graze his cattle on his land, and also of his right to hold the land; and, further, it is sometimes grievously injurious to the cattle driven. It is, therefore, a clear invasion of a triple right—the right to graze one's cattle on one's land, the right to hold the land, and the right of ownership in the cattle."

The Most Rev. Dr. Clancy, R. C. Bishop of Elphin, also condemned boycotting and cattle driving, but countenances the application of pressure within the law to convince the owners of property that the time has come for the settlement of the problem.

CO. LIMERICK PRIEST'S DEATH

The death is much regretted in Limerick and in the diocese of Cashel of Rev. Patk. O'Donnell, P.P., Doon, Co. Limerick, which occurred on Sunday morning at the parochial house, at the age of 65 years. Father O'Donnell was a most zealous and devoted priest, and worked very earnestly in the temporal as well as spiritual interest of his parishioners. In Church matters he was most unremitting, and the beautiful parish church and convent and schools in the district owe a great deal to his efforts. Office and High Mass took place to-day, at which his Grace the Archbishop of Cashel presided.

WINTER DAIRYING.

Mr. T. W. Russell informed Mr. Flynn in the House of Commons that the Department had repeatedly advocated the extension of winter dairying in Ireland, but farmers were slow to move in the matter. The Department did not propose to take any action until the results of their experiments in Clonakilty, County Cavan, and County Antrim were available. The Vice-President of the Department mentioned that the value of the exports of dairy produce, poultry, eggs, and bacon, etc., from Ireland in 1906 was, £9,799,069, and of cattle, £9,148,915.
