IMPERIAL CABLE SERVICE

The "Standard" says—The Ottawa Board of
Trade, a body resembling our Chambers of
Commerce, have reprinted in pamphlet form
their recent address to the Governor-General
of Canada in reference to the proposed Imperial
cable service, with his Excellency's reply and
other documents bearing on the subject.
Strategically, economically, and commercially,
the pulsing wires threaded round the earth
will belong, not to individual Englishmen, but
to English-speaking communities, the last, and
not the least, of the "British possessions." A

THE THEATRE PROJECT

It is understood that steps are being taken to
replace the Theatre Royal, Henry street, with a
structure that will in every respect conform to
the needs of modern times. A couple of meetings
of the gentlemen moving in the matter have
been held, but so far nothing definite has been
decided on. It is stated that the enterprise, to
carry it through successfully, would run well
into four figures, as the entire of the present
building would have to be cleared away. For the
present, however, the public must await another
meeting of the promoters, who will then finally
decide whether the scheme can go on or not.

THE CITY'S HEALTH

At the meeting of the Public Health Com-
mittee last night the Mayor presiding, the
annual report of Dr. McGrath, Medical Officer
Superintendent of Health, was submitted. The
report, which deals very elaborately with the
health of the city for the year, contains a
variety of suggestions which are of far reaching
importance to the citizens. Emphasis is laid on
the congestion caused through over crowd-
ing in the old parts of the
city, a phase of city life which
has never ceased to draw special attention from
Dr. McGrath since he took up office under the
