ES ACT DISPUTES.

Limerick Quarter Sessions to-day, King County Court Judge Law-Smith, Ryan, a house painter, sued the Committee of the Limerick House Society to recover the sum of £50, that the defendants conspired to procure the dismissal of plaintiff employment of Messrs. J. M. Namara hereby in consequence of defendants plaintiff lost his situation on 19th 1907, and has been since unable to employment. The case for the plaintiff went to Dublin, and there joined the Amalgamated Society of Operative Shop Painters and Decorators, without the approval or consent of the local society.
