Establishment.

It is interesting to show the establishment of the militia in the United Kingdom, and the present, absent, and wanting to the militia of 1907, has been compared with the total of all ranks present in 1881, while 1,758 men were present in 1881, 809 were absent without leave, and the strength was therefore 20,889. The establishment is 29,279, leaving 8,390 men complete the establishment. For the United Kingdom there is a total of 33 militia of all ranks.

Tierney was committed to Limerick prison pending a magisterial investigation into the facts.
