DEATH OF LADY MONTEAGLE.

We record with extreme regret the death of Lady Monteagle, which occurred yesterday morning at Mount Trenchard, Fe nes. The deceased lady had been ailing for a considerable time, but it was not until a fortnight and that her condition assumed a critical stage. Since then her ladyship had been very cociously indisposed, and, as stated, the end came peacefully yesterday morning in presence of the members of her family, who had watched with unremitting attention and devotion the various phases of her

Lady Monteagle, who was a daughter of the late Right Reverence Dr. Butcher, Bi-hop of Meath, was married in 1875 sarly in her married life she evinced the greatest interest in the w liare of the people of Foynes-an interest that was continued down to her death. Apart from a wide knowledge of the world, derived from reading and bravel, Lady Monteagle shared in no inconsiderable way the genus associated with the names of her brothers. Mr. John George Butcher, K.C., who represented the City of York in the last Parliament, and Dr. Samuel Henry Butcher, the junior Member for Cambridge University. She was a lady of engaging personality, kind, considerate, and sympathetic In Foynes the extent of her popularity was i amesurable, and now that she has passed away to her reward, outside her own immediate friends by none will her loss be more sincerely mourned than by the inhabitants of the pretty the Monteagle family. Save for a month or two every year, when she either sojourned in London or abroad, Lady Monteagle lived regularly on the banks of the Shannon, where she never wearied in advancing the welfare of those mongst whom she made her home. She was foremost in every movement inaugurated for the betterment of the people, and it was mainly through her efforts that the Cottage Garden and Small Industries Show annually associated with Foynes was established. In this as in everything she undertook she had the undivided cooperation of Lord Monteagle and the other members of her family, whose keen bereavement is shared in notalone by Foynes, but by the entire county and city in the loss of a good and benevolent lady. In 1902 she was induced to allow herself to be nominated for a seat in the Rathkeale Poor Law Board and District Council, when she was returned at the head of the pell-a proceeding that was repeated three years later, when she polled nearly ninety per cent. of the voters on the register. As a member of the Poor Law Board her services were invaluable and given with that generosity which characterised every action of her life. Here she brought to bear that intimate acquaintance with the Poor Law which was afterwards displayed in her evidence before the Commission on Workhouse Reform, She was a frequent visitor to the Union hospital, where her words of comfort and solace had a cheering effect on the poor sufferers. Her evidence before the Commission was given with a clearness and readiness that disclosed an intimate knowledge of the Workhouse system and its drawbacks, and the suggestions made by her to remedy these defects will not be found to be the least valuable of the many which were abodied in the Commissioners' report. Monteagle took a deep interest in the Free Library movement, and during the negotiations which resulted in Mr. Carnegie bestowing a library in Rathkeale, she was an active member of the Committee which secured this inestimable boon. She was convinced that only by good and wholesome reading could the obstacles to progress be cleared away and the people made conversant with the methods which would end in the country's advancement. deceased lady, it might be said that she represented all that was noble and true in the sphere which she adorned, and while she will be remembered with affection by those of her own exalted station, her memory will, we venture to say, be best perpetuated by the humble dwellers of Foynes and district, in whose uplifting she played a prominent and an abiding part.

The funeral will leave Mount Trenchard at 12 o'clock to-morrow (Wednesday), and the family specially request there may no flowers or artificial wreaths.

CANADIAN HAMLET WRECKED.

Many Lives Lost,

Ottawa, Monday.

The hamlet of Notre Dawe de Salette was yesterday practically destroyed by a landslide, dver thirty persons being killed, many being swept down the mountain side and drowned in the river.

Later details place the loss of life in the landslide at Notre Dame de la Salette at thirayseven. The bodies have been recovered. FOOD AND DRUGS ACT.

Important Cases.

At the Listowel Petty Sessions on Esturday, tirse farmers named Broderick, Molyneaux and Walsh, were proscented by the local Inspector, Sergeant Keane, for unlawfully selling butter as Listowel butter market on the 24th January, containing 16, but under 20 per ceut, of water.

Mr. John Condon, solr., defended, and owing to the cases being the first there since the new Butter and Margarine Act of 1907, considerable interest was taken in the proceedings.

In Broderick's case it was proved that he had affix da label stating that the barter contained bout 20 per cent. of moisture, and Mr. Condon submitted that this was sufficient disclosure a time of sale, and that the new Act did not apply to sait butter made at private danies.

With regard to Molyneaux and Walsh's cases, the labels had not at the time the Inspector took the samples been actually affixed, although at the time of sale by Walsh to the merchant, it was, and having heard evidence of the process adopted at the making and packing of the butter, the court fined Molyneaux 148 6d, and dismissed Walsh's case.

THE LICENSING BILL.

Irish Temperance Executive's Manifesto.

The Irish National Temperance Executive has issued a manifesto in support of the Licensing Bill signed by Cardinal Logue, Primate of Ireland, and twelve other Catholic Bishops. The manifesto states that the Executive have carefully considered the policy shey should recommend to the advocates of temperance in Ireland in the present juncture, and speaking so the Government's Bill proceeds—We warm'y approve of the measure in its main lines as an able and courageous effort to deal justly and temperately with a great evil, and we specially welcome the recognition of the principle of local option, gradual decrease of the excessive number of lice ces and application of the time limit. While we regret that the Government has not dealt with the Irish licensing question and sheep. Th in this Bill, we feel bound to recognise the increased difficulty which such an extended sphere of operation might present to the passing of the Bill, and we feel that we are justified in entertaining the strong belief that the Government, and especially the Chief Secretary for Ireland, will take an carly opportunity of offering to Ireland its own Licensing Bill-so long needed and desired. The manifesto says these views have been endorsed by Cardinal Logue, the Archbishop of Tuam, and Bishops of Ferns, Clogher, Elphin, Kilmore, Cloyne, and Waterford and Lismore, Galway and Kilmacdu gh, Kerry, Meath, Ross and Ardagh and Cionmacnois. No adverse opinions have been received from any Catholic Bishop. The Executive, therefore, ask for the measure the acrive aid of the lrish members of Parliament.
