IMPORTANT SWINE FEVER

An important order, affecting the movement of swine, throughout swine faver affected areas in England, has beenipromulgated by the Board of Agriculture in the "Londor Gazeite." It is provided that swine may only be moved into a scheduled area under license, and except undercetain conditions such swine cannot after arrival be removed for a period of twenty-eight days. In the case of swine consigned from Ireland to any bacon factory, slaughterhouse, lairs, marker, or salegard in the scheduled area; the license authorising such movement shall be a license signed by an impactor or other officer duly authorised in that behalf by the Department of Agriculture and Technical Instruction for Ireland.

LADY MONTEAGLE.

A correspondent pays the following tribute i The Times " of to-day to the memory of Lady Monteagle. With warm sympathies, and, above all, an intense feeling for the poor, she combined a fine brain and organising powers of mind. Mainly through her initiative the Workhouse Reform Association for Ireland was started some eleven years ago, an Association whose labours have done much to create a more enlightened public opinion in Ireland on the social questions that come within its sphere. She shrank from appearing and appearing in public, yet on one or two conscious she overcame her natural reductance, as at the Pror Law Conference in Relfast, where she read a paper on the boarding out of children, which after wards was widely circulated, and exardised much influence. Her deep laterest in this and kindred questions indeed her to stand for the Board of Guardians in the Rathkeale Bural District, County Limerick. To this body she was at once elected under the Local Government Act. of 1938, and continued a member to the day of the death. Many usoful raforms were carried on at their augustion. She selected the probationers, advised on all the details of the plan, and reported to ber friend on the progress of the work. She will long be mourced in her own county by high and low. The poor in her asighbourhood speak of her as the best friend they ever had, and it is as the friend of the poor that she herself would have wished to be remembered.
