## LICENSING BILL.

### Second Reading Carried.

In the House of Commons yesterday the debate on the second reading of the Licensing Bill was brought to a close. In the division on Mr. Cave's rejection motion the Government had a majority of 250. On the main question the second reading was carried by 394 to 148; majority, 246.
