HORSE BREEDING

Recommendations by Royal Commission.

The Royal Commission on Horse Bre-
 eding their twelfth annual report, just publish-
 ed, state that since the appointment of that body
 583 stallions have been awarded premit-
 tances for the average annual production of foals
 733.

The Commissioners state that it is ex-
 ceedingly satisfactory to state that on two most
 points the work has been most suc-
 cessful. They find an increasing number of
 animals among the competitors for pri-
 zes and the young stock descended from wi-
 ning premiums.

The Commissioners have been advis-
 ing that horses are bought for military pur-
 poses by foreign Powers now in the United Kin-
 dom the age of three years, and that, conse-
 quently, the best are gone before the English au-
 tions come into the market.

They repeat, therefore, the recommen-
 dations they have made before, namely, that
 horses should be purchased at the age of
 three years instead of four, thereby securing the
 choice of our own horses for our own
 and giving a distinct encouragement
 to the horse-breeding industry of the kingdom.

A telegram from Sidi-Bel-Abbes, in
