#### More Marriages Births

The Registrar-General's statistical report for marriages, births, and deaths in England and Wales during 1907, contains some highly interesting figures. The report shows that in England and Wales during 1907 there were 276,038 marriages, giving a rate of 15 per thousand of the population. The death-rate was 0.2 above the corresponding rate in the previous year, and equal to the rate during the preceding ten years. The birth-rate numbered 9 per thousand, the total number being 26.3 per thousand. This rate was 0.1 higher than in the previous year, and 0.1 lower than in any other year on record. The average for the period 1901-1907 shows a birth-rate for 1907 shows a rate of 1,000. The death-rate for 1907 was 15.2 per thousand, the total number being 524,311. The rate was 0.4 higher than in the previous year, and the lowest death-rate of infantile mortality during the period 1901-1907 was 15.2 per thousand below the rate for 1907, and the lowest rate on record was 15.2 per thousand. The rate was mainly attributed to the weather experienced during the year, which was compared with the average for the corresponding period in the previous year.
