## BIRTHS, MARRIAGES, & DEATHS IN

### More Marriages Births

The Registrar-General's statement regarding marriages, births, and deaths in England and Wales during 1907, contains some highly interesting figures. The report shows that in England and Wales during 1907, 276,038 marriages were registered, giving a rate of 15 per thousand of the population. The rate was 0.2 above the corresponding year, and equal to the preceding ten years. The proportion of 26.3 per thousand. This rate was 0.1 in the previous year, and in any other year on record with the average for the period. The birth-rate for 1907 shows a rate of 1,000. The death-rate for 1907 was 0.4 per thousand, the total number of deaths being 524,311. The rate was 0.4 per thousand and the lowest death-rate of infantile mortality during the year numbered 9 thousand below the rate for the preceding year, and the lowest rate on record, mainly attributed to the weather experienced during the year compared with the average for the preceding ten years.
