QUARTER SESSIONS CALENDAR.

DEATH OF CAPTAIN W. H. LEE.

We regret extremely to observe the announcement of the death which took place on the 18th ult, at Melbourne, of Captain William Henry Lee, eldest son of Mr. S. E. Lee, J.P., of this city. As an artillery officer, Captain Lee saw service on two occasions in Northern Nigeria during which he was wounded twice with poisoned arrows, and was invalided home owing to an attack of fever. Some eighteen months ago he went to Melbourne, securing an important appointment as Captain of Constabulary at New Guinea. Here he unfortunately contracted a malignant type of malarial fever which becoming recurrent undermined his constitution and his demise at the very early age of 31 years will be heard of with deep regret by his old friends and colleagues in Limerick. We deeply sympathise with his respected family in their sorrow. The St. Mary's band of bellringers of which Mr. S. E. Lee is a Vice-President, adjourned last night as a mark of respect, and the monthly vestry meeting of the Cathedral, of which the deceased gentleman's father has been secretary for forty years, also adjourned yesterday afternoon without transacting any business.
