## TRINITY QUARTER SESSIONS.

### A CLAIM AND A SET OFF.

At the Limerick Quarter Sessions this evening, before his Honor Judge Law-Smith, the adjourned case of Mr. John Daly, late Alderman and Mayor, against Mr. Anthony Mackey, of Castleconnell, came on for hearing. The claim was for £2 6s. 11d. for goods supplied to the defendant, who had a set off for the like amount £2 6s. 11d. money alleged to be paid by defendant for plaintiff in connexion with a week-end trip to West Clare which the litigants had within the past six years as set out in particulars, and made up in railway fares, hotel bills, refreshments, drinks, and tips to servants.

Mr. O'Sullivan, solicitor, who appeared for the plaintiff, said they would go into the case now.

Mr. H. Blackall, solicitor for defendant—We admit the claim. The question is one of set-off.

His Honor—Very well; you can begin, Mr. Blackall.

Mr. Blackall said the claim was for a balance due on foot of an account. What actually occurred was this. Mr. Mackey, in addition to owning the oel weirs at Castleconnell, kept a victualler's shop in that village, and occasionally he required a certain class of meat, which Mr. Daly procured for him. They were on terms of great friendship, these transactions occurring in 1904. They took a week-end trip to Lisdoonvarna, Miltown-Malbay, and the west coast, and it was arranged they should divide the expenses. The trip was from Saturday to Tuesday, and Mr. Mackey would tell his Honor where they went. The cost was more than double the set-off, and having been discussed it was agreed that the balance due and the set-off should settle the whole matter. Since the arrangement was made they met several times, but owing to some dis-
