## ALARMING MOTOR ACCIDENT.

### Two Naval Officers Killed.

Brunswick, Friday.

A terrible motor accident has occurred at the  
 village of Meine, near here. The driver of  
 a car, travelling at the rate of eighty kilometres  
 an hour, in order to avoid a lady on a bicycle  
 who was turning out of an adjoining street, put  
 on his brakes so hard that the car spun round  
 on its own axle, and then dashed with terrific  
 force into a boarding. The owner of the car, First  
 Lieutenant Fritzsche, of Leipzig, and Captain  
 Lieutenant Max Assmann, of Kiel, both of the  
 German Navy, were killed. Another Naval  
 officer, First Lieutenant Elmenhorst, had his  
 collar-bone broken, and the man Rieke had his  
 collar-bone also broken. Both men were  
 removed to hospital. The party had motored  
 from Frankfurt-on-Main, and were travelling  
 via Brunswick and Hamburg to Kiel.
